They left behind over twenty miles of tunnels filled with impressive timbers, ancient graffiti, and lots of period equipment and other artifacts. 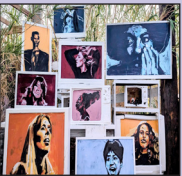
### 5 Drinking Water Kiosk

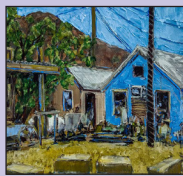
### 11 Tecopa Hot Springs Resort

### 21 St. John The Baptist Mission

This striking building is perched on a lonely desert knoll just south of Shoshone. Opened in 1967, it was built largely by local miners. St. John's is a Mission of Santa Rosa Catholic Parish of Lone Pine, CA – a parish that encompasses 8,000 square miles and covers both the highest and lowest points of elevation in the continental US! ### 22 Dublin Gulch Caves

These fascinating caves were dug out of a layer of volcanic ash formed by the Lava Creek eruption in Yellowstone, over 600,000 years ago. It is unknown exactly when the caves were first dug out and inhabited, but it was likely in the late 1920s during the silver boom at the Noonday Mines. The caves were home to many over the years, most of them local miners. They remained occupied to some extent well into the 1970s! **Located behind the Shoshone historical cemetery.**



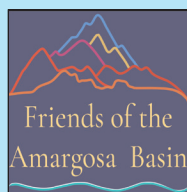
### 23 Crowbar Café & Saloon

The Crowbar Café & Saloon is located in the heart of Shoshone Village. Built in the 1930s, the restaurant still serves handcrafted cuisine. The adjoining saloon has long been famous as a meeting place for locals and visitors alike. A patio and stage were added in the 1990s, and it serves as a venue for events such as weddings, community celebrations and music festivals. 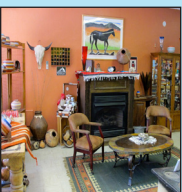


### 25 Friends of the Amargosa Basin

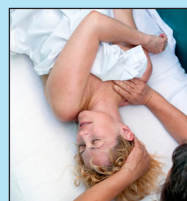


### 27 Shoshone Inn

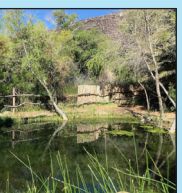

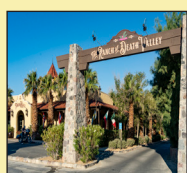
### 35 The Inn at Death Valley

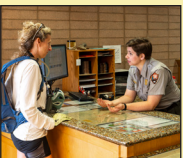


### 37 The Ranch at Death Valley
